Why is SeeKenya's work so important?

In the UK, it's easy to get high-quality eye care treatment. All you have to do is book an appointment at your local Specsavers (or alternative, fill in the gap!), be treated by an expert optometrist and you'll walk out with a fresh pair of glasses that day if not very soon after. There's also the option for prescriptive sunglasses, contact lenses and even laser eye surgery. And even better, some people are covered by the NHS - they can access this excellent service for free or for a discounted price.

This is not the case in Kenya. And that's why we exist.

Over 95% of Kenyans live without access to eye care according to the World Health Organisation (WHO). Let that sink in. **Over 95%.** Millions are struggling to see the backboard in class, or to see and hold their newest grandchild or keep working in the career they love. Eye care is an essential healthcare human right. And we work to achieve this by reducing blindness, providing specialist treatment and high-quality eye care services.

Plus, 80% of visual impairment is preventable or treatable. That means we can contribute in fixing this problem. But **we need volunteers and supporters like you to make this a reality.**



What is SeeKenya's story?

SeeKenya works in partnership with the NGO Edfri International, born from our relationship with the King's Church Mid-Sussex. SeeKenya has been an established charity for over 10 years. It all began when our co-founder Pete Marson, a qualified optometrist, visited Kenya for the first time and was deeply moved by what he saw. He encountered first-hand the widespread poverty, and the devastating effect of a total lack of eye care treatment.

He came back changed, and **determined to make a difference.**

Fast-forward more than a decade, we've served thousands of people and set a solid foundation for change to come.

Where is SeeKenya headed?

Ever since SeeKenya was born in 2010, our vision has been to create a place for the community to come and receive excellent eye care services, and later an eye care hospital to complement the clinic.

Our bi-annual clinics currently see around 2,500 people – which is no mean feat! Nonetheless, with a fulltime clinic working with 5 optometrists, **we could see up to 21,600 patients**, serving the Northern Kenya region.

While we will never turn away someone who needs our help, at times our hands are tied because of the limitations on us as a small charity.

As a result, plans and building works are currently underway to establish a permanent eye care clinic at Isiome Hope Centre. Until this is completed, the twice-yearly clinics will continue running - **which is where you come in.**

Tell me more about the trips...

We typically run two trips a year in March and September. Our teams consist of 12-15 UK volunteers, plus the all-essential optometrists and Kenyan volunteers.

Our trips are normally for 14 days. This includes time for training, 8 days of running the clinics, travelling and some downtime. We aim to treat over a thousand people per trip - although this does now need to take Covid precautions into consideration. While we often see more than a hundred people turning up for our clinics, we aim to treat every patient who walks through our door. Every person has a reason to be there; we want to return their trust in us by **offering the very best care we can.** The clinics provide eye heath screening, refractive eye tests, prescription glasses, sunglasses and medication where required. We also refer and pay for surgery where appropriate. Full training is given so if you have no eye care experience, you soon will!



Excitingly, we are also offer a safari trip included in your time in Kenya. This is an incredible opportunity to see some magnificent wildlife up close and personal, and tick off the 'Big Five' off your safari bucket list. It's also a chance for some R&R and to bond with your fellow volunteers.

No trip to Kenya would be complete without an experience of Kenyan church. We're proud of our partnership with Kambakia Christian Centre led by Ed and Fridah Buria. They are the powerhouses of Edfri International, and **their passion to see their community thrive is infectious**. Learn more about the Burias and Edfri International <u>here.</u>

This also means that we get to join the Kambakia church service on one of their Sundays.* For some volunteers this is the highlight of their trip - it's easy to see why. They are full of joy and excited to welcome us as their guests. It's a real honour to be a part of their church community. Our Kenyan volunteers are also part of Kambakia and we love working with them. They assist us in the clinic and are part of our team at every stage of the process. They carry on the work when we return to the UK.

*You may be aware we are a Christian charity. Our faith underpins everything we do at SeeKenya. Although it is not a requirement to be Christian to be a part of SeeKenya trip, we ask that you are sympathetic. We believe in doing everything as a team while we're in Meru, which includes attending Kambakia church. We promise it will be an experience like no other!

Everything you need to know....

• Will I be given training?

We expect our team members to attend the training sessions ahead of flying out. These are normally just one day or 2 evenings depending on schedules, but they're a chance to meet the rest of the team, ask any questions you might have and learn more about the essential work you'll be doing. These sessions take place in Burgess Hill in West Sussex (RH15 9LR).

We do understand that it might not be feasible for everyone to attend in-person. If this is the case, we invite you to join us via livestream so you won't miss out.

If it's your first trip with us, we'd also love to meet you! Please make every effort to attend in-person or if you are unable to make the training, we will arrange a separate meeting with you prior to the trip.

SeeKenya is committed to the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults and expects all volunteers and staff to do the same. All volunteers involved in clinics trips will need to undergo a full DBS enhanced check and safeguarding training.

How much does it cost?

Our trip fees are currently set at £1,500. This includes everything other than the following;

- 1. A VISA (costing approximately £35)
- 2. Any immunisations you may need (please book an appointment with your GP or local travel clinic to arrange for these)
- 3. Anti-malarials (depending on the type you choose to get, they can be purchased from a travel clinic or ASDA)
- 4. Spending money! £100 is plenty for this, but it gives you the chance to return with a memory or two, or a gift for a loved one.

You can pay in a lump sum or in instalments. However, we do require an initial deposit of £700 once flights have been confirmed and when you have confirmed you are joining us. At this stage the payment is non-refundable. The remaining balance must be paid 8 weeks before travelling, unless a payment plan or JustGiving page has been set up and agreed with SeeKenya.

• What's the accommodation like?

During our time in Meru, we are guests of Kambakia Christian Centre, which is in the church complex. It is basic, but it is clean with wonderful housekeepers who cook and take care of us. Sleeping arrangements are



either in individuals or shared rooms with your own toilets. Just as a heads up, sometimes the water supply

is unreliable and hot showers are not a guarantee. But it is important to remember that by Kenyan standards our living arrangements are very luxurious, and we are grateful for the love they show us.
